




Grace Lamb (Lambchops) - Yashna



Interview with Mr Abrahams



1. What do you enjoy about teaching history?

To summarise, the thing that I enjoy most about teaching history and teaching in general is interacting with young people. I aim to bring out the curiosity and enthusiasm that they already have within them in class by making a connection between the events we learn about in lessons to the present day.

2. In your opinion, what is the most interesting historical event of all time?

Well, if you ask what my favourite event is I would definitely say it's Martin Luther King Jr's 'I Have a Dream' speech in August 1963. It's all about unity and bringing people from different backgrounds together which is a message that is still relevant today. However, if you ask me what the most important historical event of all time is, I would say when Hitler became chancellor of Germany in 1933. This is because it is such a cataclysmic event that led to World War 2 where millions of people died; it also marked when colonialism and the beginning of the Cold War between the United States and the former Soviet Union.

3. What advice would you give to someone who would like to be head of a school's history department one day? That's a really hard question, but I would say you should read widely around and immerse yourself in the subject. Resilience is definitely the most important quality to have, which is reflected in Northwood School's RECIPE for success, as being a teacher is very hard work and having a passion for history is absolutely vital. Work hard on trying to be the best teacher you can be and do what you love as it will truly inspire the young people you want to educate.

Upon arrival at the historic and incredibly important Bletchley Park on Tuesday the 24th of January, we were greeted by the very attentive and polite staff on hand at the site and were prepared for our tour of the facility. We began by watching a short cinematic masterpiece on The D day landings at normandy and were intrigued to learn of the intelligence behind the operation which could be directly credited to Bletchley Park and their hard work. We later walked around the facilities of Bletchley and were introduced to a code breaker machine called 'The Bombe'.

Bletchley Park Trip



After a pleasant lunch in Hut 6 we met with our tour guide Bob who proceeded to take us around fascinating areas of the site which included looking at old war vehicles such as ambulances and motorbikes which he expertly described whilst also cracking some jokes. Afterwards Bob escorted us towards the cinema room where we enjoyed watching a slightly longer film detailing the genius behind the Bletchley Park team and their role in the allied troops successfully landing on the beaches of France. Bob was very knowledgeable of Bletchley during the 1940's recalling to us the names of famous codebreakers who worked behind the scenes for allied victory in the second world war and who were crucial in cracking the German code. On top of this our group was also pleasantly surprised to hear about the role of women at Bletchley during the war as ³/₄ of the 9000 workers at the site were women. After Bob concluded our tour we headed to our final activity of the day which was a workshop in which we learnt about the brilliance of the Enigma machine and even had a go at breaking codes ourselves in smaller groups.

Overall we had a fantastic day at Bletchley Park and we could not thank the staff enough for their efforts to make us feel welcome at the facility and many of us will certainly consider revisiting Bletchley Park in the future.



Achievements outside of school



I would like to share my experience on attending six Engineering Masterclasses at Brunel University. My first Masterclass started with looking at the ginormous Sound Lab in Brunel and how sound affects our daily lives. We also got a chance of winning a mini sound lab kit which made all the participants a bit competitive and, at the same time, very excited. Furthermore, we learned about aerodynamics in planes and how engineers plan something before building it and how maths can be used in real life to solve problems which can help lots of people. We also did a fun experiment with Coco-Cola or Pepsi to see which one is better. In addition, we also learned about how gravity can affect a bridge: we were encouraged to think about the science behind it is rather than the design of the bridge.

Furthermore, we got to use 3D printers and make keychains and learn about how 3D can be a better way of manufacturing lots of products at the same time. On the final day of the masterclasses, we got to build a bridge and put weight on it to see if it can withstand it. Our last session was great fun because we got our 3D keychains and certificate of completion.

Overall, it was a very pleasant experience and I got the opportunity to learn new things and meet new students from different schools. I would like to thank Mrs Adams and Mrs Seagrove for giving me this wonderful opportunity.
