

Feedback and assessment at Northwood

Teaching and Assessment at Northwood



Assessments should be carried out every 3-4 weeks



- For any given unit of work there will be regular assessment.
- Approximately mid-way through a unit the **Mid Unit Assessment** will take place
 this is a **chapter int** which allows the tagebor to see where students are in
 - this is a **checkpoint** which allows the teacher to see where students are in their new learning so far. Students are then given **feed forward** work which allows them to react and respond to the marking.
- At the end of a unit there is an End of Unit Assessment, a more formal
 assessment, where the outcome of this is recorded by the teacher and used
 towards reporting.

Book Polish

Students develop their ability to review and take responsibility for their own learning through 'Book Polish' which takes place in form time.

THE ONE ABOUT PARENTS AND GRADES

It is one of the most common and important questions that parents ask teachers at parents evening - 'what can I do to best help support my child?'. So researchers reviewed 37 studies on the effects of parental behaviours and attitudes on childrens grades. This involved a sample of over 80,000 students and their families. They then made suggestions as to what does and doesn't work

THE MAIN FINDINGS


Their study found that four of the best things a parent can do at primary and secondary school level to help their child's grades are:

Have High Academic Expectations
Having high aspirations and expectations
of your child has the biggest impact on their
grades. Parental expectations include how
important school is, their attitude towards
teachers, and the value of education.





This includes developing and maintaining communication with children about their school life. This helps parents nip any potential problems in the bud before they manifest into bigger issues.





Homework rules

This revolves around having clear rules to deal with how they divide their homework and leisure time. Explaining why these rules are in place can help them to make better decisions regarding their independent study time later in their school career.

By contrast they found that behaviours such as parental attendance of school activities and supervising homework did not make a significant impact on grades.



Main findings:

- 1. Have high academic expectations
- 2. Regular communication
- 3. Good reading habits
- 4. Homework rules





Accessing Satchel:One - Student








Accessing Satchel:One - Parent/Carers





Students received their logins as well as two parents logins in form this morning.

Parent logins have been mailed home and should be with you shortly.



1. Students forget they have homework

Your child must get into a routine of checking Satchel:One every day when they get home from school

Parents/carers can support their children by logging into satchelone.com with them and asking questions about the homework:

"Can you show me what homework you have?" is much better than "have you done your homework?"



2. Students don't do homework in the correct environment

After school Homework Clubs are available. Your child must use this if they need support with homework / a quiet place to work

Make sure your child works in a quiet (**distraction-free**) place. The most effective students do their homework in the same place and at the same time every night. Remove distractions such as tablets/computers/**phones**.



3. Students don't manage their time correctly

Students should not leave homework until the last minute. They should plan out when they are going to do each homework to avoid always doing it the night before it's due.

Students will need support managing their time. There is a calendar feature on Satchel:One where parents can help students plan and spread homework out evenly over time.



4. Students don't understand the homework

Students can approach their teachers after school or at lunch time. This will require forward planning and should not be done on the day of the deadline.

Ask your child if they understand the task. If they don't, they need to contact the teacher in good time.

- ' I dedicate time to completing my homework in a suitable environment.'


Organisation is **a skill** that needs to be **taught / learned**.




